Children can play in small groups, with partners, or with a classroom volunteer on this fun game to practice elapsed time and their telling time skills. It could even be used as a homework activity.


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
Preparing Materials


- ♥ run dice patterns on tag board or construction paper
- children cut dice out along the outer, solid line
- ♥ fold the tabs and glue into a cube

Directions for Play

Children may work on this activity in small groups, with partners, with a parent volunteer, or even as a homework activity. Children take turns rolling the clock die and reading the time shown on the clock. They roll the elapsed time die next, identifying what the new time will be. Players must agree on the new time for play to continue.
